Feature	Freshwater	Saltwater
Setup Cost	Lower	Higher
Maintenance	Easier	More complex
Livestock	Hardy, less vibrant	Exotic, colorful
Equipment	Basic	Advanced (skimmers, powerheads)
Chemistry	Simpler	Precise salinity, trace elements

Understanding this foundation helps you match your tank to your lifestyle.

Freshwater Pros:

1. Lower entry cost
2. Easier to find supplies and fish
3. Simpler maintenance routines

Freshwater Cons:

1. Less vibrant colors (though still beautiful)
2. Limited exotic species

Saltwater Pros:

1. Stunning corals and fish variety
2. Opportunity to build reef ecosystems
3. Engaging, ever-evolving tanks

Saltwater Cons:

1. Water parameters need close monitoring
2. More complex equipment



If you're just starting and want low risk, freshwater might be best. But if you love a challenge and visual drama, saltwater offers big rewards.



Freshwater Needs:

1. Tank, filter, heater, light
2. Substrate (gravel or sand)
3. Regular water changes (every 1–2 weeks)
4. Basic testing: pH, ammonia, nitrite, nitrate

Saltwater Needs:

1. Tank with sump or AIO (All-In-One)
2. Protein skimmer, powerheads, heaters, lighting
3. Live rock, live sand, and salt mix
4. Advanced testing: salinity, alkalinity, calcium, magnesium

Basic Equipment	\$150–500	\$500–1,500+
Fish	\$2–\$20	\$20–\$150+
Maintenance/Month	\$10–\$30	\$30–\$80+

1. Tetras, guppies, angelfish, barbs
2. Generally hardy and easier to breed

Saltwater Fish and Inverts:

1. Clownfish, tangs, gobies, shrimp, snails
2. Corals, anemones, macroalgae
